

On Good Friday there will be two services in Church, at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. We were glad to notice last year a greater number present at the Morning Service; but the Evening Service was not well attended. We do hope, year by year, to see a greater number coming to Church on this the most solemn day of the year.

On Easter Day there will be two celebrations of the Holy Communion at 8 and at 11. This is the greatest festival of our Church year, commemorating the great fact, which is the foundation of our Faith, the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and, in consequence, the general resurrection of the dead. "As in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive."

For this reason Easter Day has ever been a day upon which the Holy Communion is

received by all; and all our Communicants are earnestly invited to be present.

The Bishop of Exeter has appointed a day in the month of June for the Confirmation. A Confirmation Class will be formed, soon after Easter, of which due notice will be given in Church.
